

Australian Disclosure Preparedness — One-Page Briefing

Request

Please ask the Minister for Health and Ageing to commission an Australian Health Needs Assessment and preparedness scoping process for the psychosocial, mental-health, and community-resilience implications of high-impact UAP/NHI disclosure and related paradigm-shifting information events.

Why this matters now

International disclosure-related activity is accelerating. The United States is actively releasing UAP-related records through its official PURSUE process. New public-health and psychological-preparedness reports from the uNHIDDEN Foundation (UK) and the Disclosure Foundation argue that the main public-health risk of a high-impact disclosure event is not mass panic but concentrated strain on mental-health, crisis-support, community-trust, and information systems.

On 29 June 2026 the French National Assembly held its first parliamentary colloquium on Unidentified Anomalous Phenomena, convened through OPECST, its scientific and technological assessment office. A crisis-management expert addressing the session, Sylvain Maisonneuve, stated on the record that France was not equipped to react to, communicate about, or interpret a large-scale United States disclosure release (*"the answer is no... it exposes us"*), and called for a formal readiness method and a governance authority positioned high enough to inform political leadership — a comparable democracy's legislature naming, in public, the same preparedness gap this request identifies in Australia.

Australia has no visible preparedness framework. This request does not ask government to endorse any conclusion about UAP or non-human intelligence. It asks government to do what it already does for low-probability, high-impact risks: assess, scope, and prepare.

Australian relevance

Australia has its own historical record. In 1971, O.H. Turner, Head of Nuclear Branch in the Joint Intelligence Organisation, submitted Scientific and Intelligence Aspects of the UFO Problem inside the Department of Defence, arguing Australia lacked an adequate intelligence, scientific, and public-relations framework for this issue. The document is publicly available through the National Archives of Australia (A13693, 3092/2/000) and was cited by name at a bipartisan US Capitol press conference in June 2026.

Australia also has a ready health architecture: 31 federally funded Primary Health Networks, Lifeline Australia, Medicare Mental Health Centres, state mental-health systems, and Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisations.

The questions

- **Health:** Given new international public-health and psychological-preparedness work on UAP/NHI disclosure, will the Government commission an Australian Health Needs Assessment on ontological resilience and disclosure preparedness, including guidance for PHNs, Lifeline, state mental-health services, and ACCHOs?
- **Defence:** Has Defence reviewed the 1971 Turner/JIO archive document and Australia's current UAP reporting and assessment pathways in light of active allied UAP record releases?
